




TIP: Wellness Calls



- Write scripts for calls to ensure information is provided in a nonpartisan manner especially if you are a 501(c)(3).
- Remind older clients about registering, requesting an absentee ballot, and voting early or on November 3rd.
- Reminder: Track ballot at <u>NYC tracker</u>





TIP: Virtual Programming



- 30 minute Information Session around voting
- 30 min Facilitated Discussion around voting stigmas, fears
- Make your own Voting masks
- How to talk to family and friends about voting
- History Class on Voting in the USA

TIP: Dispel Common & Unusual Myths about VOTING

MYTH: Only people who speak English can vote

Anyone registered to vote can cast a ballot, regardless of what language they speak. Polling sites provide information and ballots in multiple languages.

MYTH: You must bring identification like a birth certificate

New Yorkers simply need to find their polling site and sign next to their name on the voter roll. Voter IDs are a hot-button topic in the United States, but elected officials throughout New York have made it clear that people do not have to show identification to exercise their right to vote.

TIP: Communicating Key Details

- Day of Voting: November 3, 2020
 - a. You have the right to ask for an interpreter
 - b. Wear a mask (and gloves) and stand at least six feet apart while waiting in line
- Encourage older adults to vote by absentee or at an early voting site to avoid long lines and possible COVID exposure





TIP: Requesting Absentee Ballot

- If older people don't have a computer, **give phone number** to request absentee ballot.
- Go to this website, click on county and get phone number for local board of elections: https://www.elections.ny.gov/CountyBoards.html
- You can use COVID-19 as the reason for requesting your absentee ballot





TIP: Returning Absentee Ballot

- Use drop boxes, per Executive Order, for absentee ballots
- Drop off a ballot at an early voting site
- Track my ballot using the <u>NYC tracker</u>
- Friend/neighbor can mail a signed and sealed ballot





TIP: Leverage current engagement strategies to promote voting!



- Make frequent announcements at online events
- Educate clients about voting utilizing phone calls, mailings, social media, and deliveries (home delivered meals)!
